Adesegun Olayiwola FATUSI is a Nigerian Professor of Community Medicine and Public Health who has served in leadership positions within academia, international development settings, and civil society for over two decades. He is currently the Vice-Chancellor of Nigeria's first specialized medical and health university, the University of Medical Sciences (UNIMED), Ondo, Ondo State. Before his appointment with UNIMED, he was a Director of International Research with the Guttmacher Institute in New York, USA. He served previously at the Obafemi Awolowo University (OAU), Ile-Ife, as Provost of the College of Health Sciences; Director of the Institute of Public Health; Director of Population and Reproductive Health programme; and, Head of the Department of Community Health. He was also the President of the Global Alumni Association of the College of Health Sciences, OAU from May 2017 to May 2021. He is the founding President of the Academy for Health Development (AHEAD), Ile-Ife, Nigeria – an indigenous health research and social development organization. He previously worked as a Technical Adviser with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)'s programme in Nigeria from 1996 to 2001 and has served as a consultant to several agencies, including WHO, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNAIDS, World Bank over the last two decades. He has also severally served as a Temporary Adviser to WHO Headquarters on adolescent health issues.

He is the Chairman of the Ondo State Inter-Ministerial Committee on COVID-19. He also chairs the Governing Council of the Anglican Compassion and Development Initiative – the national faith-based organisation of the Church of Nigeria – and the Nigerian Anglican War Against Drug Abuse and Addictions. He chairs Nigeria's National Technical Working Group on Adolescent Health and is also a member of the Population Advisory Group for the National Population Commission. He is a member of the Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health Technical Advisory Group for the WHO African Regional Office; and the first Lancet Commission on Adolescent Health. He chairs the Advisory Board of the multi-country Global Early Adolescent Study involving the Johns Hopkins School of Public, WHO & USAID. He is the immediate past Vice-President (Sub-Saharan Africa) of the International Association on Adolescent Health. He has served on the Governing Board of the National University Commission and the Management Board of Obafemi Awolowo University Teaching Hospitals. He chairs/serves on the Board of over 10 youth and reproductive health-focused NGOs and supports several community-based health initiatives in Lagos, Ogun, and Osun States. He is a Pastor in charge of Teen and Youth Ministries at Chapel of Grace, OAUTHC, Ile-Ife.

He is an accomplished teacher, mentor, and researcher, and has over 11,000 research citations. He has led over 25 externally funded research projects. He has played a leading technical role in the development of the proposals that Nigeria submitted to the Global Fund on HIV, Tuberculosis and Resilient and Sustainable Systems for Health over the last 10 years. He has served as the Lead Consultant for several national studies in the field of reproductive health, including those focusing on adolescent and school health, maternal health, HIV and AIDS, and gender-based violence. He has also served as the lead consultant for the development of over 10 national policy and strategy documents on Adolescent Health, Youth Development, HIV and AIDS, and Reproductive Health. He led the development of Ghana's Modular Course in Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health in 2016 and Namibia's National Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health in 2018.

He obtained his medical degree from OAU in 1987 with distinction in Community Health and the Lawrence Omole Award for the best student in Community Health. He won the Federal Government of Nigeria award for the best candidate in the Part I examination of the Faculty of Public Health, National Postgraduate Medical College of Nigeria (NPMCN) in 1992. He also earned his Master of Public Health degree from the Hebrew University, Hadassah, Israel, in 1995 with *summa cum laude* honours and as the best graduating student. He obtained the Fellowship of the West African College of Physicians in Community Health in October 1995. He also has a Ph.D. degree in Public Health from the University of Ibadan, and a Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree from NPMCN. He was a 2001/2002 Packard-Gates Population Leadership Fellow at the University of Washington, Seattle, USA and a Visiting Scholar at the Bill and Melinda Gates Institute for Population and

Reproductive Health, Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, Baltimore, USA in 2007. He is a Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Medicine as well as the Nigerian Academy of Science. He is married to Olawunmi Fatusi (Nee Buluro), a Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Medicine; the first female Profesor of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery in West Africa; the first female Dean of the Faculty of Dentistry at Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife, Nigeria; and, current President of the Nigerian Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons.

2. RESOURCES FROM INSTITUTIONAL PARTNERS AND OTHER STAKEHOLDERS

The various training programmes I initiated had generated funds for OAU and some of them have continued to run till date and continue to generate funds, in addition to the fact that some partner agencies also provided the University with start-up financial grants and/or equipment. A few examples are highlighted below.

(a) Capacity building initiatives:

- *MEASURE Evaluation-supported Monitoring & Evaluation Training programme:* A 2-year partnership with the USAID/MEASURE Evaluation led to the establishment of the first institutionalized short certificate programme in Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) in Nigeria in 2010. In the first year of the partnership (2011), PRHP received a total grant of ₦14,184,546.88 from MEASURE Evaluation and directly earned another ₦10,147,000.00 from participants' fees within the period of my leadership of the Institute of Public Health. The course has continued to run twice till date and the 18th edition ran in August 2019.
- *Health in Sub-Saharan Africa” Short Courses:* Commenced in 2011 in partnership with WHO, UNFPA and the Federal Ministry of Health. The course received support from WHO and UNFPA in the form of funds, resource materials, and resource persons
- *John Snow Incorporated (JSI)-supported Logistic Management Training Programme:* As the Director of the Institute of Public Health, I initiated the partnership with JSI in 2013, resulting in IPH's hosting and institutionalization of JSI's training on Logistic Management in OAU starting from 2014.
- *Management Science for Health (MSH)-supported Health Systems Leadership Training Programme:* I initiated a partnership between the College of Health Sciences and MSH in 2014, resulting in the institutionalization of MSH's training on Health Systems Strengthening in OAU, and the running short courses on Health Systems Leadership and Management by the College of Health Sciences. MSH trained our facilitators and, in addition, provided us with technical support for the development of the College's Strategic Plan and was responsible for the cost of accommodation, feeding and transportation for all the participants who participated in the final process of developing the Strategic Plan, which took place in Ibadan. MSH also conducted leadership and management training for all the administrative leaders across the College for two years as well as two training on mentorship and partnered with us in developing our formal academic mentorship programme. Furthermore, MSH provided the College with a diesel generator, 12 laptop computers, two projectors, a photocopier, conference table and chairs, and 8 office tables and chairs, among others.
- *UNICEF-supported LearningPlus Project:* I led the development of the successful proposal, and the take-off of the implementation of a 3-year national capacity-building project to be funded by UNICEF Nigeria office, UNICEF provided 3 computer sets and accessories to OAU. The project built on my previous work with UNICEF HQ as a member of an international group of researchers coordinated by Teachers' College, Columbia University on a multi-country LearningPlus research.

- *West Africa Infectious Disease Institute (WAIDI)*. OAU became an institutional member of WAIDI through my partnership drive as the Provost of the College of Health Sciences. WAIDI provided opportunity for capacity development for the College team on infectious disease control and some resource materials, particularly in the face of the threat of emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases.
 - *The “Ife Medical and Dental Advancement Preceptorship Programme”*: As the Provost of the College of Health Sciences, I initiated the “Ife Medical and Dental Advancement Preceptorship Programme” as a partnership with College’s alumni in diaspora through which teams of expert alumni come to the College at their own travelling cost to teach and provide specialist medical services with the College staff, including surgical care. Eight of such programmes were held during my tenure, with each one featuring 3-5 foreign-based alumni.
- (b) *Direct Fund Mobilisation from Stakeholders*: As the Provost of the College of Health Sciences (2013-2017), I mobilized over ₦100 Million Naira from alumni and friends of the College in Nigeria, United Kingdoms and USA, which was used for developmental projects, including the renovation of Multidisciplinary Laboratories (MDL), renovation and development of modern facilities for the Medical Illustration Unit, establishment of the Clinical Skills Centre, establishment of a sleep laboratory, development of a Gym and Occupational Therapy Workshop for Medical Rehabilitation Programme, and Electric Generators, Laptops and Office Furniture, development of a 16-room office facility for academic staff, and Hostel building and welfare projects for students
- (c) *Development and Sales of Branded Souvenirs*: As the Chair of the College Alumni Relations Committee, I designed a good quality branded tie and scarves for the University and contracted Corporate Clothiers US and TM Lewin to produce the first set to mark the College’s 40th anniversary. As the Provost, I built on that initiative and developed an array of branded souvenirs including dress shirts, T-shirts, bow-tie, and a range of other branded items that were actively marketed very successfully to alumni and other stakeholders in- and-out of the country and several sets of hundreds of those products have been reproduced with significant gain to the College and the College Alumni Office.

3. EXTERNAL PROGRAMME FUNDS FOR NIGERIA

I have contributed to the development of national proposals that enabled Nigeria to secure several millions of dollars from the Global Funds for HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (GFATM), and OAU had also directly benefited from one of the grants

(a) *Team Leader: Development of Nigeria’s Funding Proposal on HIV, Tuberculosis and Resilient and Sustainable Systems for Health for Global Fund for AIDS, TB & Malaria*

From April to May 2017, I served as the Team Lead for the development of Nigeria’s proposal for GFATM focusing on HIV/Tuberculosis and Resilient and Sustainable Systems for Health (RSSH) for the sum of US\$346 million for a three-year period (2018-2020).

(b) *Adolescent Health Lead: Development of Nigeria’s proposal for Adolescents and Young People HIV Prevention programme funded by the Global Fund for AIDS, TB & Malaria*

In 2014, I developed the Adolescents and Young People (AYP) HIV Prevention programme component of Nigeria’s concept note for funding which attracted US\$2 Million to Nigeria from the Global Fund for AIDS, TB and Malaria. The Society for Family Health (SFH) that served as the Principal Recipient for that

component funded OAU Institute of Public Health to implement an Action Research to reduce the HIV vulnerability in Akwa Ibom, Oyo, Kaduna, and the Federal Capital Territory to the tune of ₦124,954,700 (One hundred and twenty-four Million, Nine Hundred and Fifty-Four Thousand, Seven Hundred Naira); I served as the Adviser on the Action Research.
